I remember hearing the Gospel message as it was framed in Campus Crusade's little evange-listic tract, *The Four Spiritual Laws*. Law One is, "God loves you and has a wonderful plan for your life." I left church reminded of the words of the Psalmist, "The lines have fallen in pleasant places for me." It is a privilege to be a Christian, to be a minister of the Gospel, and to get to see the fruit of one's labor. It was no lie that God has loved me and unfolded His plan for me faithfully...a day at a time.

Heavenly Father, Thank You that You are faithful to work things out for my good, even though I don't always see it that way instantly. Amen.
